Key Question: Who wants to be your friend forever? **Bottom Line:** Jesus wants to be my friend forever. **Basic Truth:** Jesus wants to be my friend forever.

Make It Fun Activities

Play (Doh) It Again

What You Need: "Jesus," "Disciples," and "Angry People" Activity Pages; cardstock; craft sticks (three per child); tape; scissors; and Play-Doh®

What You Do:

Give each child a "Jesus," "Disciples," and "Angry People" cutout, three craft sticks, and some Play-Doh. Assist the children in taping each of their pictures to a craft stick. Show the children how to shape a small amount of Play-Doh and then stick one of the craft sticks into the Play-Doh. The Play-Doh base will allow the children to stand their story pictures on the table and move them around without them falling as they retell the story.

(Note: If you have enough Play-Doh, give each child enough for them to make a tomb and stone.)

What You Say:

"I am giving you three pictures and three craft sticks. When I am done I'll tell you what to do with them. (*Hold up "Jesus."*) "Everyone look at this picture. Our story was about something amazing He did. Who remembers His name? (*Pause.*) Yes! His name is Jesus! Tape this picture to one of your craft sticks. (*Pause as you assist.*)

(Hold up "Disciples") "Everyone look at this picture. These were Jesus' friends, the disciples. They went everywhere with Jesus. Tape this picture to another one of your craft sticks. (Pause as you assist.)

(Hold up "Angry People") "Everyone look at the faces on this picture. Are these people happy or angry? (Pause.) Yes, they are angry. Tape this picture to your last craft stick. (Pause as you assist.)

(Hold up some Play-Doh) "Now that we have all of our stick people ready, we can use this Play-Doh to help them stand. (Demonstrate as you talk.) Take some Play-Doh, mold it a little like this, and now take one of your stick people and push the end of the stick into the Play-Doh. (Stand one of your stick people.) See? Now it can stand. Let's do that with all three of our stick people."

"Now you can tell the story with me using your stick people. Just do what I do."

(Hold up "Jesus") "God sent His Son, Jesus, to be our friend forever. Jesus did amazing things only He can do, and He loved everyone."

(Set "Jesus" down so He is standing.)

(Hold up "Disciples") "Jesus had some very close friends called the disciples. The disciples followed Jesus everywhere. They heard Him teach about God and saw Him do amazing things only He can do."

(Set "Disciples" down by "Jesus.")

(Hold up "Angry People") "One day, some angry people came and took Jesus away. They hurt Jesus so bad that He died. (Lay "Jesus" down.) Jesus' friends were so very sad. They wrapped Jesus' body and buried Him in a tomb. "

("Jesus" is down, the "Angry People" and "Disciples" are off to either side of "Jesus.")

"Then, three days later—count with me: one, two, three—JESUS CAME BACK!"

(Stand "Jesus" back up.)

"When Jesus' friends went to the tomb, it was empty. Jesus wasn't there anymore. Later, Jesus went to visit His friends. (*Bring "Jesus" and "Disciples" together.*) He wanted them to see that He was alive and He wanted to tell them He wanted to be their friend forever."

After the Activity: "Jesus did what only He can do so we can be friends with Him forever. Jesus loves us that much! Who wants to be your friend forever? [Bottom Line] Jesus wants to be my friend forever! And now you have these stick pictures to help you tell your family and friends that Jesus is alive and He wants to be their friend forever, too!"

"Now, let's see if you can say the verse while you move in different ways. Can you say it while you jump? Let's try." (Repeat the verse several more times with the movements indicated above.)


